RCMP

- David's office has made enquiries about additional police resources, but they have no firm answers yet
- RCMP staffing depends on not only population but also crime rate
  - Students are not included in the population count

- A business case has been made for more police resources as of 2021, but the outcome is not clear yet
- Wreck Beach also takes up community police resources
- There are provisions for adding police resources when needs peak, but this has been used for festivals etc rather than the increase in the student population we see through the school year or incremental problems over the summer

Noise related complaints

- The UEL needs ticketing authority David's office is looking into mechanisms for this
- Tickets would go to the person causing the noise. CAC and public think it should go to the owner of the house

- 7. Email from Sue Hurd
  - Garbage and leaf pick up
    - Landscapers usually take care of the leaves
    - The UEL could encourage neighbours to compost
    - From the end of October through the beginning of December, the UEL picks up 2 bags per week per household for yard leaves, If a resident has leaves outside of this window, the UEL recommends hiring someone to come pick them up
    - Christmas tree pick up is in January
    - Please see other comments in the Manager's Report
  - Empty homes
    - Following up with owners in regard to empty houses
    - Construction and public safety is a priority at construction sites at the moment while the UEL is understaffed
    - The houses in the letter have received letters from the UEL Manager
  - Linda Leonard's concerns about poor visibility on University Blvd from the plants on the medians
    - The median plantings were intended to reduce the number of people jaywalking

- They were an experiment and may be modified next year
- Mojan was wondering about adding electric car public charging stations within the UEL

# Manager's Report - Sept 16, 2019 CAC Meeting

Development Permits issued: DP#14/17 – 2225 Acadia Rd

Staff – Hiring underway for a planner, water operator, mechanic and building inspector.

Construction

- Acadia South Trench paving was completed for last year's sewer pipe installation.
- Toronto Road Trench paving underway to complete BC Hydro conduit installation.
- Acadia North Pipe installation is largely complete. Curbs, gutters and road base work is underway. Paving will run into October and is weather dependent. Landscaping public boulevards is the last step.
- Wesbrook Mall Project still underway with added complexity of September traffic. Target to finish bulk of on-street works by end of the month.
- Ieləm Cedarwalk Excavation and shoring underway. Generally truck traffic is expected to use Crooked Branch and Shortcut Roads, however Crooked Branch has road construction underway so Toronto Road will be used until this is completed.

Projects

- Community Centre report Consultant's report is complete and being circulated internally. Expect to bring it to the next CAC meeting. Staff be continuing to work on financial and operational issues raised by the report and by the CAC.
- Area D Plan report Consultant's report being reviewed. Depending on outcome, expect to bring that to the CAC November meeting.
- UEL will be trialing PayByPhone for parking meters and 'new' parking spaces along the west side of Acadia between Toronto and Ortona. Signage will be installed to correspond with when this new service will 'go live'.
- UEL will be trialing the HOPR bike share program that has recently be adopted by UBC. These black/blue bikes will have designated parking around the Village. UEL residents can join the HOPR share program through the <u>hopr.com</u> website.
- Emergency Preparedness
  - UEL has been updating its emergency preparedness plans. UEL now has a plan for temporary water supply to residents in the event of service interruption, but it relies on residents having their own water for the first 72 hours.
  - Household Guides will be distributed with fall newsletter. They are available online from EMBC.
  - What is the CAC / community interest in another Preparedness Day next year?
  - Emergency Preparedness
- Water

- Water billing software is changing and so will be the invoices. We expect there may be some bugs, as with any new software. If your invoice doesn't look right, please come to the UEL office to discuss.
- New software has the ability to implement tiered pricing this will allow the UEL to implement conservation strategies in the future.
- Water restrictions were limited this year but we need to plan for conservation in a changing climate.
- Garbage / Recycling Background
  - Garbage trucks and routes are designed & sized for the volumes collected, accounting for seasonal variability.
  - Green waste collection relies on homeowners (and their landscapers) to recycle large volumes they generate.
  - Fall leaf collection: up to two bags per household last week in October to the first week in December.
  - Christmas tree collection in January.
  - When the province moved to unified recyclables collection MMBC Emterra in 2015, the UEL changed to bi-weekly residuals and weekly green waste & added kitchen waste. This doubled the green waste collection. There is no capacity to increase this.
  - Route & truck study was conducted last year confirming system viability as part of the planning for garbage truck replacement.
